

Formed in Oct 1921 in Reserves; in Jan 1942 was still in Reserves when it became 75 Tank Destroyer Bn

- HQ at Salt Lake City, Utah; assigned to 66 Cav Div

-348 Cavalry Regiment (Georgia National Guard)

Formed in Nov 1973 (# 348 derived from parent 48 Bde); Regt had just one sqdn, which had been created from parts of 748 Cav in 1968 as 1st Sqdn/196 Cav, and in 1973 became 348 Regt. HQ at Griffin, Georgia; still existed in 1975

[# 349 to 712 not used]

-713 Cavalry Regiment (South Carolina National Guard)

Formed in Dec 1973; had a complex lineage, details of which are not worth relating. HQ was probably at Beaufort, SC; still existed in 1975

[# 714 to 747 not used]

-748 Cavalry Regiment (Georgia National Guard)

Formed in April 1963 with following lineage: Originated in Nov 1955 as 48 Recce Bn; 1959 = 1 Recce Sqdn of 108 Armor Regt; in 1963 became 748 Cav Regt, but the Regt had just the one sqdn (under 48 Armor Div). In Jan 1968 the 784 "Regt" was dissolved; parts went to 1st Sqdn of 196 Cav, which in 1973 became 348 Cav Regt (covered above)

*** Tank Battalions of the World War I Era (through 1930) ***

1) The Initial Sequence (established Feb 1918)

-1st Separate (Heavy Tank) Bn of 65th Engineer Regt - Formed in Feb 1918; in March 1918 became...

-1st Heavy Bn, Tank Service - As such moved from USA to UK in March 1918; in April 1918 became...

-41 Heavy Bn, Tanks - Until June 1918; then became...

-301 Tank Bn - A heavy tank unit; moved from UK to France in late Aug 1918 and fought attached to the English Tank Corps: first action was on 29 Sept at Le Catelet (Somme Offensive); fought in this sector through 8 Oct and also on 17 and 23 Oct
